

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




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MESSAGE FROM THE METROPOLITAN



Dearly beloved in the Lord,

Greetings of love to all in the name of Jesus Christ.

I humbly offer praise and glory to God Almighty whose abundant grace has enabled me to complete 50 years in the priesthood ministry. I praise God remembering all who helped to shape me for this ministry by assuredly convincing me of my call and mission as a priest and bishop. I remember with gratitude the prayerful support from esteemed bishops and priests. The constant love, care, and prayerful support of the children of God continue to give me immense strength to this day. In a special meeting arranged in Bengaluru (Bangalore) on June 24, 2022, greetings and best wishes were bestowed by the Church. Thanksgiving services were conducted in parishes on June 26th. Let me convey my thanks to all. We need God's grace to move on. Again, I request all the children of the Church for your prayerful support in the days to come.

During the month of June, schools reopened after summer vacation in India. In other countries, schools open a few months later. Congratulations to all students who go to school in the new academic year. Education is an ongoing process. We do not want to churn out human machines

that merely accumulate high marks and grades in examinations. Instead, we want education to provide excellent experiences to ignite goodness in people.

Today the world is undergoing drastic changes in nature due to global warming. We are experiencing extreme heat, heavy rains and floods, superstorms, and other natural calamities more frequently. Heavy losses have occurred in agricultural areas. Those who investigate the reasons for climate change, have found answers in human activities. Man's irresponsible approach to nature has brought disaster. We celebrated World Environment Day on June 5th. We should not forget our responsibility to take care of nature which is God's gift to people.

The 2022 batch of students who completed seminary education, are being prepared for this great ministry. Already around 28 priests have entered the services of the Church this year within the month of June. Priesthood is the most beautiful symbol of discipleship. Some persons enter this ministry with vested interests. I want to remind everyone that only those who are prepared to take up the challenge to follow the One who called, should come forward for this ministry. Parents should prepare their children who aspire to join the ministry by providing them a home life and atmosphere that is conducive to nurturing spiritual growth. Aspiring priests should also take the initiative to shape and equip themselves for their spiritual calling. The believing community expects us to live in transparency,



humility, and purity. It is true that St. Paul's observation in 1 Corinthians 4: 10 will empower them to glow in pastoral work; "We are fools for Christ, but you are so wise in Christ. We are weak, but you are strong! You are honored, we are dishonored!" Best wishes to all of you who are entering into the pastoral ministry this year. Pray that your service would provide comfort to many.

We are moving through a period of several types of crises. Our lifestyles and stances are reflections of our faith. Thereby they should be helpful to communicate our witnessing. In post-Covid times, it is not desirable to be extravagant when you celebrate parish jubilees and centenaries. You must limit expenses on festivities and must prioritize activities and development programs that benefit the common person and ultimately glorify God. I urge all of you to be thrifty when you have marriages, baptisms, funerals, and other such functions.

Dr. Philipose Mar Chrysostom Mar Thoma Valliya Metropolitan First Memorial Lecture was conducted at Pattoor St. Thomas Mar Thoma Church, Thiruvananthapuram (Trivandrum) on May 1, 2022. Mr. Rajan Gurukkal delivered the keynote address. His Grace Major Archbishop Cardinal Baselios Mar Cleemis Catholicose offered the felicitation. The meeting aimed at introducing the future generation to Mar Chrysostom's philosophic world, his spheres of action, social fields, and his mission and vision in their reality. I convey my thanks to Pattoor St. Thomas Mar Thoma Church that set the stage for the meeting.

I happened to participate in the closing session of the 250th anniversary celebrations of the Malabar Independent Syrian Church (Thozhiyoor Church). This Church did not surrender to the pressures of foreign forces and has preserved its identity for all these centuries. The Mar Thoma Church has a strong and meaningful historical relationship with the Thozhiyoor Church, It was the Thozhiyoor Metropolitans who came to Kottayam and consecrated Metropolitan Titus I at a time when the Malankara Mar Thoma Church had no existing bishop. Both churches continue to maintain the strong bond of friendship and remain sister Churches even today. I wish the best to the Malabar Independent Syrian Church in its faith journey well into the future.

I participated in the convocation ceremony of the Malankara Syrian Orthodox Theological Seminary at Mulanthuruthi and delivered the convocation address. May the good relationship between both churches continue for times to come.

It is a matter of immense joy to know that Rev. Dr. Jerry Pillay was elected as the eighth General Secretary of the World Council of Churches (WCC). He is a member of the Uniting Presbyterian Church of South Africa. He is at present the Dean of the Faculty of Theology and Religion at the University of Pretoria (UP). The Ecumenical Movement has created history by electing a person of Indian ancestry. The Mar Thoma Church conveys its best wishes, support and prayers to Dr. Jerry Pillay who will take charge as the General Secretary of WCC on January 1, 2023.

The 110th session of the Mar Thoma Students Conference was held under the auspices of the Kottayam Center at the Mar Thoma Theological Seminary, and the Mar Thoma Seminary Higher Secondary School from 29th to 31st May 2022. The main subject of study was, "Faith Assets in Changing Times." More than 300 students from various parts of India participated in the conference. All the leaders of the conference including Rev. Dr. John G. Mathews, and Rev. Nebu K. Varghese who led the Bible studies, and the conference committee members deserve our appreciation.

I visited our faith community in the northeastern part of India from 20th to 23th June. Holy Communion services were conducted at the Guwahati Mar Thoma Church. and Kohima Christian Church. While the number of our members is decreasing in this region, it is essential that we make optimum use of our assets and properties there by letting them out to other ministries serving in that area.

Rev. Dr. Baiju Markose was a teacher at our Dharma Jyothi Vidya Peeth Seminary, Faridabad. He sent a letter through the Seminary principal stating that he is resigning from the pastoral ministry of the Mar Thoma Church. So, Rev. Baiju Markose is hereby relieved from all his responsibilities as a priest of the Mar Thoma Church. Priests are expected to uphold their loyalty to God Almighty, according to whose call they have become priests. The clergy should lead lives that transcend their personal desires and interests. I exhort those who make commitments to serve the church and community with utmost sincerity, a sacrificial mentality, and always remaining within the constitutional and legal framework of the Church.

We celebrated Independence Day on August 15th. Seventy-five years have passed since we obtained freedom from colonial rule. Now we are the biggest democracy in the world. Let us remember all our freedom fighters. The Christian community also made contributions to the freedom struggle. Today, modern India witnesses many abuses that were prevalent during the colonial rule. Everywhere we find demagoguery rather than democracy. Defection of Members of Parliament and Members of Legislative Assemblies has become a fashion nowadays. Horse trading in politics





is now a day-to-day affair, though anti-defection laws exist. We must think seriously of our responsibility as Christians in fighting such evils in our country.

Mrs. Droupadi Murmu has been elected the 15th President of India. She is the first President from a tribal community. Mrs. Murmu is a gem of a woman who has proved her mettle in the sociopolitical scenario. After being elected President of the nation, she declared in her maiden speech that she intends to empower women and the poor in the country. She believes that her highest achievement would be the victory of everyone who overcomes poverty in India. The Indian Presidency is symbolic. It symbolizes democracy. We wish our country's new President every success.

We know that there was a crisis in the administration in Sri Lanka recently. People showed unfettered wrath and not without reason. They protested in the streets in the face of starvation, unemployment, lack of availability of essential commodities and inability to fulfill basic needs. The president went into exile. The prime minister was under siege. The Parliament became nonfunctional. At this critical point, the Metropolitans of the Church of Ceylon, aware of their Christian calling, in a statement requested the administrators, the army, and the common people to exercise self-restraint. They also reminded the administration not to curtail citizens' rights under the pretext of enforcing the state of emergency. The Sri Lankan Church shows us the true mission of the Church when a nation's existence itself is in jeopardy, and the relationship between the ruling and the ruled deteriorates.

The US Supreme Court recently canceled the constitutional right to abortion. The life of a human being is sacred. Experts have different opinions about the time of the formation of personality in a human embryo. But the most important thing is God's will, which is life's perfection and wholeness. Life before birth and life after birth are equally important. We should also be concerned about the changes that can occur among the marginalized people who struggle hard for obtaining health care.

The tragic and cruel assassination of Shinzo Abe, the former prime minister of Japan, was a great shock for world peace. He maintained a good relationship with India and the USA. He always stood for world peace.

Sheikh Khalifa bin Zayed Al Nahyan, the second president of UAE, passed away. He was able to guide UAE to progress through tough decisions and exhortations for change. He led them through a new path of tolerance. He was generous and kind to the diaspora, people of other religions, and women. Let us share in the sorrow of that country. We express our heartfelt condolences.

We take this opportunity to convey the best wishes of the Mar Thoma Church to the new president of UAE, Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan.

The 15th Lambeth Conference was held in Canterbury from 27 July to 8 August. Held every ten years, this is the most important event of the Anglican Communion. The theme of the conference was "God's Church walking, listening, and witnessing together for God's World."

The half-yearly Clergy Conference was held on 15 July through Zoom. This is a forerunner of the annual conference. The theme for this year's conference is, "The World is gasping for Breath — Challenges for Pastoral Ministry." An introduction to the forward of the theme and some initial discussions on the topic took place during the half-yearly conference.

The Malankara Catholic Church consecrated two new Metropolitans, and the Malankara Orthodox Syrian Church seven Metropolitans. The Jacobite Syrian Church has decided to appoint two more Metropolitans. Congratulations to these Churches, and their Church leaderships. All the best wishes of the Malankara Mar Thoma Syrian Church to the newly consecrated Metropolitans. We pray for God's grace to strengthen them in their new positions.

His grace Zacharias Mar Polycarpos, the former Metropolitan of the Malabar Diocese of the Malankara Syrian Orthodox Church, passed away. We commiserate with the Malankara Syrian Orthodox Church.

Rev. Chacko P. Jacob Pattamukkil, Rev. Abraham Chacko, Rev. N. V. Korulla, and Rev. M. V. Thomas, who served the Church gloriously, were called to their eternal abode. Let us praise God for their great and noble service. They served the Church along with their families in the most blessed manner. Pray to God for the solace and comfort of the bereaved members of their families. I convey the heartfelt condolences of the Church.

The Church entered the period of Pentecost during the month of June. We read and meditated on different missions. We celebrated the Feast of Pentecost on Sunday, June 5. The Holy Spirit is God's promise and the evergreen presence of the true God. The Holy Spirit is the atman that guides to all truths. The Holy Spirit, in emerging circumstances, makes clear the importance and meaning of the Word and messages of Jesus Christ. And the Holy Spirit leads believers to more godly experiences when they live their lives in moral purity. We observed "Trinity Sunday" and "Environment Sunday" on June 12th. Today, environment has become a spiritual topic. 'Holy Trinity' is the basis of the history of Divine Redemption. When God, the Father, with the



Son, created the universe, the Holy Spirit radiated in it. St. Paul states that creation is in bondage to decay and waits for the glorious freedom of the children of God. May Trinity Sunday help us stand up for the wholeness of creation. 'Discipleship - Calling for Christ Experience,' was our topic of meditation on June 12th. The Lord called the disciples to him, to send them out to preach and to drive out demons. By being with the Lord, individuals experience comprehensive transformation. On June 26th, we meditated on the theme, 'People of God Ministry and Model.' We must be careful about our day-to-day lifestyle for not to have the Word of God get corrupted. The confidence and faith that the omnipotent God is always with us must be the foundation of our life. The Church has the calling to baptize all and to nurture them to discipleship. This is possible only when we are strengthened by the Holy Spirit.

The meditations and the Bible portions for July indicate certain empowerments that should occur in Church life. Sunday, July 3rd was 'Mar Thoma Apostle Day'. The subject of thought was 'Apostle Thomas - Faithful unto Death,' The Church is apostolic and holy. The children of Malankara should inherit the words, deeds, and lifestyle of Apostle Thomas, who proclaimed the faith that was made pure by his constant praise of God. Only by dying with Christ are we able to live with Christ. We derive the richness of life through suffering. When we forsake flattery, blunders, impurity, untruth, and avarice forever, and adhere to peace, salvation, goodness, and purity, we become true inheritors of our faith and tradition. Our role model of faith is the Apostle who was ready to die along with Christ. We observed July 10th as 'Priest Sunday.' The subject of our meditation was 'Priests: Ambassadors of Christ.' Priests represent Christ. Christ is the door. Only through the door that is Christ can one enter pastoral care. Nobody wants to see ministers as symbols of cultural decay. Leaders of the laity and priests must be aware that we are called to witness. The Church must pray diligently for the clergy to engage in the sacramental rituals and the proclamation of the Word, steadfastly adhering to holiness and truth. The Church meditated on the sacrament of healing, that is, 'Anointing the Sick,' on July 17th. Our Lord, Jesus Christ, gave much importance to healing ministry. He gave his disciples the power to heal the sick. Prayers made in faith brings healing. The prayer of a group together and the prayer of the leaders of the Church are symbols of reconciliation and mutual forgiveness. On July 24th, we reflected on the topic, 'The Sacrament of Holy Matrimony.' Family is a holy institution and the strong underpinning of society. The partnership and mutuality of man and woman are not merely of the flesh. Families with mutually reciprocated understanding and responsibility, provide ennobling dimensions to humanity. Real Christian families remain strong throughout life. Holy matrimony reminds us of a very grand family culture based on the love of Jesus Christ. The meditation for July 31st was 'Theological Education for Confirmation of Faith.' Fear of God and experiencing God are not mere subjects for study. They should go hand in hand with life experiences. Our Church has the tradition of Reformation which we obtained through open Bible. Those with theological training must serve the believers to strengthen them in faith. Trained people should be deeply committed. They should also grow in Christ experience. Let us submit ourselves into God's hands.

The topics of meditation for August were related to the basic values of the Church and our responsibilities to the nation. We observed August 7th as Mission Sunday. We meditated on the topic, "I am not Ashamed of the Gospel." The Church has the broad vision of the evangelization of India. We should share the gospel with personal conviction. We reflected on 'Christian Presence in Nation Building' on August 14th. This subject of thought is meaningful at a time when we celebrate our nation's independence. The criterion of life's fruitfulness lies in giving to others who are in need. Let us be citizens who side with goodness and strive for the betterment of a society that enjoys the freedom envisaged by Jesus. The Church celebrated 'Reformation Sunday' on August 21st. The Reformed Church has the commitment to hold firmly on to gospel values and spread them extensively. We must remember what Jesus said about the eligibility to enter the kingdom of heaven: "If your righteousness does not surpass that of the Pharisees and the teachers of the law, you will certainly not enter the kingdom of heaven." We must equip the Church with a life-providing source of spiritual force, through reformative processes. We meditated on 'Holy Communion - Healing of the Body and the Soul' on August 28th. Real healing is the reciprocal joyful existence of body, soul, and spirit. We are promised the redemption of the flesh and the healing of the soul. The basis for this is faith in Christ Jesus. Holy Communion is the anticipatory enjoyment of the authentic experience in heaven. It gives us the food that provides sufficiency unto eternal life. The ultimate challenge of the Holy Communion is our willingness to be broken and poured. Let us completely submit ourselves into the hands of the Lord for this.

The grace of our Lord and Savior be with you all!



MESSAGE FROM DIOCESAN EPISCOPA



Dearly beloved in Christ,

Greetings in the name of Jesus Christ!

The Mar Thoma Messenger, the voice of the Diocese of North America and Europe, has become an instrument for reaching out to the members of the Church for the last forty years. With grateful hearts we present this issue of the Messenger, recollecting the past and re-focusing its vision for the future. We appreciate all who have worked tirelessly for the publication of this quarterly magazine, addressing relevant themes, and providing information about Diocesan activities.

The theme for this special issue of the Messenger is 'Practice of Non-violence,' which is appropriate in the current world scenario, where the crisis of war and human aggression has led to a lot of misery and suffering. Peaceful coexistence is the divine plan for humanity, though the aberrations that cause divisions in human society are extremely harmful. The war and killings, hatred and conflicts, thwart peace on earth and is often life threatening. We must affirm that overcoming violence is a Christian responsibility, since the message of love and

peace is cardinal to the teachings of Jesus Christ. The words of Jesus, "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you" (John.14:27), give the mandate to every Christian to participate in the peacemaking work of God. Those who are blessed with inner peace bear the responsibility of becoming peacemakers and become agents of reconciliation to those who live in conflict. It is to be realized that the unshakable inspiration for the faith community with regard to overcoming violence and obtaining reconciliation and peace, is to be derived from a collective personal relationship with the omnipresent Lord, who is 'the same yesterday and today and forever.' That is why the church always prays for the 'peace from above' and for the 'peace of the whole world.'

Early church father Basil the great observes, "I cannot persuade myself that without love to others, and without, as far as rests with me, peaceableness towards all, I can be called a worthy servant of Jesus Christ." How to win worldly political power and the collective mind as well as emotional leanings of humanity through love and non-violence, is shown to the world by great leaders like Mahatma Gandhi and Martin Luther King Jr. who adhered to the way of Jesus Christ. In our present context, humanity faces fear and insecure feelings due to gun violence and communal tensions that destroy the social fabric of society. It is essential to develop a culture of peace and harmony rather than live with a culture of violence and hatred. Blessed are the peace makers, for they are called the children of God. Let our life be used to promote lifesaving actions through the practice of non-



violence for a healthy humanity. While addressing the occurrence of ongoing violent protests in many places, the World Council of Churches (WCC) stated, "Violence will never be ended by more violence. We call on those now expressing their anger in violent protest to end the violence, but to strengthen peaceful demands for accountability and reform until justice is done."

As the Diocese, we are in the process of organizing various programs in the coming months for the benefit of all members. The Sevika Sanghom conference and Young Family Fellowship retreat are being conducted in October and December. Diocesan clergy conference will be held in Dallas, Texas in October. We are happy that our Metropolitan will grace the conferences in October with his participation. The proposed retreats on mental health care at the regional and Diocesan levels will be helpful to overcome the challenges that many face, especially as a post-Covid crisis. At the

last WCC Assembly in Karlsruhe, Germany, during the first week of September, thousands of faithful members from various church traditions gathered together and proclaimed that we are called to be witnesses in the world by taking to heart "Christ's love that moves the world to reconciliation and unity." Our Church was well represented, and I personally thank God for the divine guidance to be part of this great movement for more than a decade and a half as a Central Committee member. Let us use our time, talents, and God-given skills and opportunities for the expansion of God's kingdom and for serving humanity in Christ mindedness.

The current Messenger Management Committee and Editorial Board gratefully acknowledge all those who initiated the idea of this publication 40 years ago, and the leadership that has sustained the Messenger over these years by encouraging subscriptions and soliciting or contributing submissions of thought-provoking articles, bible-based crossword puzzles, and news items. Our goal is to encourage each family in our church community to subscribe to the Messenger. We realize that we have a long way to go before reaching that goal. In addition, the increase in electronic communication and growth of digital media pose challenges for the sustainability of print media. Nevertheless, we wish and pray that the Messenger will celebrate its 50th and 100th anniversaries and remain the pride of the Diocese. The Messenger should also remain a forum for communication of thoughts and ideas that promote and sustain the growth of our diocese.

The October issue of the Messenger has always served as the Diaspora issue. Strong communities cherish their heritage and share it with their current and future generations. The exodus from bondage in Egypt is a narrative that is still fresh in the minds of the Jewish community because of the passion with which that remembrance is transmitted from generation to generation. Likewise, the pioneers in our community should dedicate time to educate younger generations

about the Mar Thoma community's history and journey from the time of St. Thomas to our establishment as the Malankara Syrian Church along the Malabar coast, and our subsequent migration to different parts of the world including the United States of America, Canada, and Europe. The growth of DNAE has been remarkable, but we have a lot more to accomplish. We have been blessed with phenomenal leadership and we pray that God will continue to grant us wisdom and lead us to do more for the building up of God's Kingdom.

Our image of God's Kingdom is a place of utmost serenity and peace. In the July 2022 issue we discussed our roles and responsibilities for establishing Climate Justice and Environmental Stewardship. It is a goal that is practically farfetched. However, without everyone's significant and serious commitment, the global community will suffer grave consequences wrought by climate change and environmental upheavals. In this October issue we are focusing on the 'Practice of Non-violence.' It is another issue of utmost importance that impacts each one of us in different ways. Is God's Kingdom a place of absolute non-violence? Understanding what violence entails may enhance our practice of non-violence.

Violence is generally perceived as acts of active aggression through behaviors involving physical force intended to hurt, damage, or kill someone or something. However, we know that violence can be much broader. Violence includes the denial of basic rights for all living beings. Violence includes the violation of laws that society has created for its peaceful coexistence. So, the extent to which anyone practices non-violence is a matter for introspection, which could be governed by



their statutory laws, self-awareness, and self-control.

The articles in this issue focus on violence and the practice of non-violence in relationship to children. women, world politics, the church and social settings. Despite extensive awareness of violence and its consequences, many engage in violence to varying degrees, and turn a blind eye or a deaf ear to many forms of violence occurring in and around us.

Genesis 6:11 notes, "Now the earth was corrupt in God's sight and was full of violence." The same statement can be used to describe our current times. Matthew 11:12 notes, "From the days of John the Baptist until now, the kingdom of heaven has been subjected to violence, and violent people have been raiding it." History documents religious fervor, extremisms, and expansionisms that have been riddled with bloody violence. Cries for justice and the end of violence get no response just as described in Job 19:7. We pray just like the Psalmist in 7:9, "Bring to an end the violence of the wicked and make the righteous secure..." The question that follows is - are we righteous? Violence is often wrought by the spoken and written word. Are we righteous in our thoughts, words, and actions?

Violence has the potential to beget violence. Hence, peace can perhaps be achieved by inaction and nonresponsiveness in the face of violence - the practice of non-violence. It could be the ideal that each one of us should strive to achieve. It is an ideal that can be achieved if we could only let go of our ego!

October 2022 marks the 30th year of Episcopacy of our Diocesan Episcopa, Philoxenos Thirumeni. We thank God for the blessings he has bestowed on Rt. Rev. Dr. Isaac Mar Philoxenos, along with our Suffragan Metropolitan Rt. Rev. Joseph Mar Barnabas, and Rt.

Rev. Thomas Mar Timotheos, who were consecrated for the Episcopal ministry of the Mar Thoma Church on October 2, 1993. We congratulate the three Thirumenis and pray that God will continue to strengthen them as they serve Christ and His church.

The Messenger also extends a warm welcome to Theodosius Mar Thoma Metropolitan as he visits the Diocese of North America and Europe for the first time after his installation as the XXII Mar Thoma on November 14, 2020. 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
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ur Mar Thoma Messenger issue this quarter is on the theme, "Practice of Nonviolence". This is an appropriate and profound theme in the present context due to socio-political and spiritual conflicts that are present both globally and locally. However, acts of "violence" may also perpetuated within the social unit of marriage and family. For this discussion, the term, conflict, will be more readily used in the context of marriage. In Genesis 2, the institution of the marriage relationship established a paradigm for communion and communication amidst stark differences. The honest interplay of two unique persons inevitably leads to some conflict. In this regard, conflict is not viewed as a "stumbling stone" but, a "steppingstone" towards marital satisfaction and the furtherance of love in the relationship.

Marriage offers an intimate connection that extends the bounds of relationship to incorporate another within the personal life and space of oneself. The dynamics of the marriage relationship thus yields itself to conflict and depth of interpersonal communication. In this context, marital satisfaction is to be understood as a variable that is both directly and indirectly impacted by instances of conflict. In fact, a significant number of couple's report experiencing marital distress due to unmanaged conflict which may affect the stability of the relationship. Marital satisfaction generally means the overall contentment, happiness, stability and holistic wellness one has in the marriage. There are various elements that contribute to

all types across relationships and marital cultures. One area of reflection is the relevance of communication.

Conflict Management: Towards Repair and Relationship Building

In the study of marital relationships, the inevitability of conflict seems to resonate across all cultural environments. It is an aspect of relationship and may be considered significant towards the maturity of the relationship. Conflict, in and of itself, has often been viewed as a destructive force in a relationship. In fact, prior relationship experiences of unresolved conflicts may give way to beliefs that conflict is irresolvable, unmanageable and indicative of relationship failure (Feiring et al., 2018). However, conflict repair and management may present an opportunity for the enhancement of the marital relationship. Underlying the notion of conflict repair, is that each specific instance of conflict represents a deeper personal matter or pain. Thus, repair addresses the person more than the presenting issue of conflict. Conflict management, is then the attempt to diminish the negative affect and reestablish positive dialogue. The research indicates that the positive construal of dialogue even in the midst of a marital conflict can lead to more effective repair (Gottman & Tabares, 2018). Consequently, positive



affect and dialogue may lead to greater emotional cohesiveness, empathy and increased friendship. The creative space that is opened during a conflict interaction may allow for vulnerable and open dialogue that can encourage maturity in the marriage relationship. There is evidence to support that conflict repair which focuses on emotional connectedness has an increased impact on the overall stability and quality of the relationship. As such, mutual acceptance of responsibility, shifting conversational narrative, humor and empathetic expression are all ways to further the positive emotional bond (Gottman et al., 2015). In so doing, conflict repair may enrich marital satisfaction.

Understanding Communication as Friendship Building

One of the essential components of all human interaction and relationship is the aspect of communication. Communication is the dynamic exchange of concepts and experiences that intersect with the identities of individuals and groups. It is critical to understand patterns of communication and its relative impact on marital satisfaction and relationship. As such, it is important to consider the utilities of psychoeducational intervention, as well as, nonsexual behavioral communication, intimate partner communication and observable communication in the study of marital satisfaction.

Marital-focused psychoeducational interventions are relatively common initiatives that may address specific topics in order to enhance relational skills and behaviors. Such programs have long been considered to be an effective means of increasing marital stability and relationship quality. Although, many psychoeducational interventions focus on educating specific skills, a change in negative behavior patterns has not consistently resulted in a greater marital satisfaction (Ripley & Worthington, 2002). However, it has been suggested that marital satisfaction is intrinsically related to the notions of friendship and conflict management. In fact, a couple that exhibits adeptness in both building friendship, as well as, effectively managing conflict

express significant improvement in relationship quality and marital satisfaction. This concept also resonates with the attestation of union as declared by Adam, "this is bone of my bone and flesh of my flesh" (Gen.2:23). It succintly expresses a commitment to see his wife as he sees himself, not as a stranger or as the other. The depth of meaning in these words express an intimacy that goes beyond relational duty. This is a fundamental marker in the experience of genuine friendship. According to research, it is interesting to note that the presence of both aspects, friendship and conflict management are neccesary for wives in the experience of marital satisfaction while, for husbands encouraging the friendship is sufficent for more marital satisfaction (Babcock et al., 2013). As such, the converse is true in that a breakdown in friendship and ineffective conflict repair leads to the disintegration of relationship Furthermore, research has indicated that in comparison to forgiveness and reconcilation, the education of effective management of problems has resulted in more positive communication and the overall health of the couple (Worthington et al., 2015). That is to say, that while forgiveness and reconciliation are integral components of the relationship, novel and dynamic skills must be learned and practiced to further the growth of the marriage. Such psychoeducational interventions introduce new patterns of communication that enhance connectedness and limit relationally inappropriate behavior. This, in turn, allows the couple a pathway towards greater marital satisfaction. fact, martial satisfaction may be nurtured even in difficult relationship circumstances. The correlation between the learning of effective communication skills complemented with enhanced friendship and conflict management supports the development of marital satisfaction (Bradley et al., 2011).

Additionally, it is important to note other aspects of communication as it relates to the experience of marital satisfaction. Nonsexual behavioral communication includes the interpersonal interactions that correspond to the functioning of the marital relationship. There is no consistent evidence to indicate that positive communication patterns indefinitely yield enhanced

relationship quality. In fact, there is research to suggest the contrary (Ripley & Worthington, 2002). That is, marital satisfaction or the presumed quality of the relationship is experientially qualified by more than an ordered set of relational rubrics. This is not to suggest that positive communication skills are unnecessary in achieving marital satisfaction rather, that the issue is more complex. There is a correlation between the perception of nonsexual behavior patterns and the corresponding impact on marital satisfaction. That is, the unique interpretations surrounding the physical and verbal/nonverbal expressions are linked to the mental and emotional well-being of the individual and marital couple. In instances of hierarchal dominance, wives experienced depressive symptoms while similarly for husbands it was in the diminishment of the filial bond (Lizdek et al., 2016). Likewise, negative nonsexual behavior patterns may cascade and decrease marital satisfaction. Thus, it is important to meaningfully address specific patterns of behavior and its associated meaning towards furthering marital satisfaction. In a related matter, the definition of effective conflict management, friendship and the marital relationship may not be constant (Rosen-Grandon et al., 2004). Thus, if these relational components are fluid then the parameters of marital satisfaction may vary over the course of the relationship. This is important to consider as evolving behavior patterns may both direct and be impacted by the notion of marital satisfaction. As such, the concept of meaning and associated symbols within marital communication is relevant. The differences in gender and shared values may also provide insight in effecting connectedness and friendship.

Another area of consideration is intimate partner communication and its relationship to marital satisfaction. The research makes a distinction between the physical component of sexual communication and the verbal aspect of sexual communication. That is, the verbal communication of sexual content had greater significance in strengthening marital satisfaction, sexual satisfaction and increased stability in the relationship than the physical act of sexual intercourse (Jones et al., 2018). This reinforces the notion that intimate partner communication has the potential to enhance friendship and support the overall quality of the marital relationship. Intimate partner communication also refers to positive physical attributions that further the emotional and mental health of the individual and couple.

Lastly, it is important to recognize the aspect of observable communication towards the development of marital satisfaction. This refers to the notion that communication is a continuous process involving observation and interpretation. That is, observational understanding serves as a primer towards marital satisfaction. It has been noted that even in the absence of disclosure the marital couple has accurately identified the personality, as well as, symbolic meaning and values held by the other (Shapiro & Swensen, 1969). Thus, perceived notions of friendship, empathy and experience may affect marital satisfaction.

In our society and faith community, patterns of avoidance, ineffective communication and lack of spousal friendship greatly contribute towards the destabilization of family and marriage systems. Distress within the home which has drastic effects on children such as contributing to depression, withdrawal, poor social competence and health problems. Additionally, such distress may increase the risk of psychopathology, extreme cases of behavior in sociocultural and spiritual contexts and physical illness. Thus, it is important to grow the marriage in the midst of conflictual and contentious situations, not whilst avoiding it altogether. Furthermore, the unlearning of maladaptive behavior patterns and the learning of constructive skills towards enhancing friendship and positive communication approaches is essential in furthering the quality of the relationship. As a church, we are the ekklesia, "a called out community" blessed and entrusted with the responsibility to blessing to all. Let us begin by taking bold steps of repair, reconciliation and renewal within our homes.

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

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

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abbi Sacks, a well-known theologian, wrote on religion: "... we are in a position to understand why religion helped us survive in the past - and why we will need it in the future. It strengthens and speeds up the slow track. It reconfigures our neural pathways, turning altruism into instinct, through the rituals we perform, the texts we read and the prayers we pray. It remains the most powerful community builder the world has known. Religion binds individuals into groups through habits of altruism, creating relationships of trust strong enough to defeat destructive emotions. Far from refuting religion, the Neo-Darwinists have helped us understand why it matters."1

If religion tends to help individuals and society to defeat destructive emotions through the community it builds up, then why would religion cause violence in this world? If you look at the history of any unrest, civil wars, and wars that happened in the history of nations and civilizations, it looks like religion either directly or indirectly caused or inspired such things in the past. It continues to play a major role even today. Does any religion advocate violence? Of course not! All religions speak of love and peace between people, sharing and caring for each other and helping others. Some religions teach that if you love others, keep peace with others, share and care for our neighbors, you will be rewarded in your next life. Some religions teach that you will be

eligible for eternal life with God if you love your neighbor as yourself, which is the essence of the teaching of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Charles Kimball's book, When Religion Becomes Evil (2002), begins with the following claim: "It is somewhat trite, but nevertheless sadly true, to say that more wars have been waged, more people killed, and these days more evil perpetrated in the name of religion than by any other institutional force in human history." Does religion cause all the violence both in the past and present or do some people use religion as a scapegoat to perpetuate their greedy ambitions? Preeminent historian Martin Marty, in his book, Public Religion, Politics, Religion, and the Common Good, argues that religion has a particular tendency to be divisive and therefore violent. If religious people believe that religion causes no violence, and they do not indulge in violence or stand for violence, then who is responsible? I would argue that every country, society, individual or group uses religion as a cover-up for their actions and to gain support for their policies and programs. When people using religion to endorse their claim to power combines with the divisive nature of forming governments, religions end up being accused of creating violence. No religion in this world advocates

violence or teaches its followers to kill another person to attain eternal life or 'moksha.' Wilfred Cantwell Smith showed in his landmark book, The Meaning and End of Religion (1962), "'Religion' as a discrete category of human activity separable from 'culture', 'politics,' and other areas of life is an invention of the modern West. It is impossible to separate religion from economic and political motives, but religious motives are innocent of violence."

Fear may be a reason individuals and groups stir up violence. If individuals and groups perceive other individuals and groups as threats, they may be tempted to resort to violence. In order to gain validity, these individuals and groups may seek the support of religion.

Freedom is the basic characteristic of civilized societies. When individuals enjoy freedom, good families are built up, which will form good societies, which in turn build up successful governments. When individuals and societies are subjected to burdensome restrictions, which limit their freedom and their choice of life situations, dissatisfaction develops and they tend to take the help of religion to express their dissatisfaction. This is another way religion is being used as a forum for stirring up violence. Religions also use politics to gain support and strength. Christianity is an example of such a religion; it received the help of the Roman Emperor Constantine to gain strength as a world religion. Religious fundamentalists use this extremism for their personal gain and achievement. The "religious wars" of the 16th and 17th centuries were fought on politics; for example, Catholic France supported the German Protestants to weaken the Catholic German emperor. The main conflict in Northern Ireland is a conflict between Protestant and Catholic Christians.

The division between the two factions seems to be greater than the divide within each faction. The conflict is widely seen as synonymous with terrorism, but it is important to see that although violence is only a part of the conflict, it is very significant as both a cause and an effect of divisiveness.

The dangers of fanaticism came to a head on September 11 and began a whole new wave of alarmed warnings. It changed the view of western countries about Islam. According to John Dickson, a founder of the Centre for Public Christianity and a Senior Research Fellow of the Department of Ancient History, Macquarie University, "the slogan: 'religion-leads-to-violence' finds plausibility today not through logic or the facts but through simple repetition. The 'religion-leads-toviolence' mantra has become a truism in our culture only because fascinating people, popular books and high-production documentaries say it over and over."

The common understanding is that religion causes more problems than it solves and religion keeps people apart more than it brings people together. To a certain extent it is true that since all religions live within their own boundaries, they view others as enemies. This is true of different denominations within Christianity and of various sects in Islam. They always fight each other as if what they believe is true and the faith of others is wrong and threatens their existence. According to atheists, religious violence has probably existed for as long as religion. History has done nothing to calm the passions, hatred, and brutality expressed in the name of religion; if anything, the progress of science and technology has enabled religious extremists to hate and kill even more effectively. Almost everyone would like to end violence, but few understand its causes. Even

Religion itself does not cause violence, but it has been used by religious fundamentalists and politicians to gain authority and power. Thus, the vehicle used is labeled as being the cause of violence in the world. All religions must proclaim to the world that they do not support violence and those committing violence in the name of the religion must be identified and restrained. But most religions are not able to do that since they are fighting within themselves or fighting each other in the name of religion. As long as religions fight each other, religious fundamentalists and politicians will probably continue to use religion as a vehicle to achieve their objectives.

Faith and fear have always been intertwined in the Christian imagination, and our continued failure to reckon with it can only lead to continued violence. William

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NONVIOLENCE IN THE COSMOS: A MATTER OF JUSTICE

iolence can be sensed all around us. Beginning with the ancient story of Cain and Abel, it has passed down to their descendants for aeons. It is a universal phenomenon, apparent from our very beginnings. Every aspect of human existence is under the threat of direct or indirect forms of violence. It is obvious that we are under fear of its bondage, and our lives are enclosed in its shadow. Violence can be defined in various ways because it has different dimensions: cultural, biological, political, economic, social, gender-based, ecological, etc. It appears in diverse forms and in various degrees, and all types of it lead to anarchy in society, which denies others' the right to exist and live in peace and equality. It is a reality that all forms of violence create a vacuum in the normal life of the cosmos and to its inhabitants. In short, it annihilates basic freedom and destroys the normalcy of all forms of life.

Apart from human beings, nature and other inhabitants of Mother Earth are under its threat. Robert McAffee

Brown points out that "whatever violates another, in the sense of disregarding or abusing or denying that other, whether physical harm is involved or not, can be understood as an act of violence." The basic definition of violence would then become "violation of personhood." Innumerable current events show us this barbaric act, such as wars, massacres, terrorism, proliferation of nuclear weapons, ethnic problems, social-cultural genocide, and atrocities on women, minorities, and other marginalized and vulnerable communities. In addition, religious fundamentalism, cultural nationalism, and exclusive ideologies pose a grave threat to peace and non-violence. Institutional forms of violence such as poverty, racism, and sexism also continue as an interminable blight. In most societies, the dominant groups use their authority or power to assert dominance, enforce subjugation and to exploit the marginalised or powerless. A person's competence and existence



in life are completely negated, and they are controlled and neglected. In such a situation, violence becomes a monolog, which treats the other person as an object to be manipulated and exploited. In summary, violence is that which dehumanises a person.

Justice and Eco Violence

It is crystal clear that the Earth is being exploited in various ways and may soon "die" (become inhospitable to humans). Degradation of land, water and air, the devastating consequences of chemical and nuclear pollution, war, deforestation and extinction of species, holes in the ozone layer, the impending floods due to global warming, population explosion, etc., threaten the Earth and her inhabitants. Only humans degrade the environment, pollute the earth, explode nuclear devices, destroy forests, dominate, and exploit the poor, kill their brothers and sisters, and make this planet unliveable for themselves and all other organisms. Here, the complexity of life increases and that destroys harmony between creatures. We are responsible for this condition, and we ourselves are the victims, especially the minorities and the discriminated.

Violence is often connected with issues pertaining to justice. If the struggle for justice becomes a sole concern, ironically, we may be unable to renounce violence, because it sometimes proves successful in achieving short-term goals.

It is a grave reality that we are dominating and ruling over the Earth. Unjust treatment of the planet by humans is one of the principal causes of the ecological crisis. In this crisis, K. C. Abraham, one of the theologians expounded that ecological issues should be seen as a matter of justice. For him, liberation for the whole creation from its bondage of injustice and violence is most important. Eco justice symbolises the conviction that issues of justice and ecology are of crucial importance and that human survival depends upon both. It provides us a way of looking at economic issues through the lens of environmental health and looking at environmental issues through the lens of economic justice. Eco justice emphasises that economic and

ecological issues are two sides of the same coin, which is the sustainable well-being of all creation. It promotes the protection of a healthy environment and justice for all people. Hence, eco justice means justice to all of God's creation. Jürgen Moltmann says, "We shall not be able to achieve social justice without justice for the natural environment, we shall not be able to achieve justice for nature without social justice." So here, justice means the end of all kinds of violence. The liberation of creation and the glorious freedom of God's children are the ultimate goal for the entirety of creation. In the New Testament, especially in Romans, Paul explains that the work of the spirit - freedom - extends to the total renewal of creation. Christ's work for redemption has taken place in the whole universe (Rom 8: 19-23). There is a similarity between the interpretation of liberation as a historical process in the Exodus, and the liberation process of creation in Romans. The former is linked to the cry of the oppressed (Ex.3: 7), the latter is promised in response to the groans within us, and in creation (Rom.8: 22). God has heard the cry of the poor and is taking their side. In the same manner, renewal of the earth comes in response to the cry of the poor and those of the silent nature.

The Church's Calling: Nonviolence

The Church has a special vocation for nonviolence. This vocation is grounded in the teachings of Jesus, the ethos of the kingdom, and the power of resurrection. Jesus taught nonviolence through his life, death, and resurrection, and revealed the qualities and essence of a harmonious life. A Christian understanding of caring must be discerned in the way of Jesus of Nazareth. His striking feature is that he did not look after his own interest, but always the interest of others. If we look at his life, we can perceive that he was always vigilant against the evils surrounding him. However, the evil forces of society killed him, and chaotic powers tried to overtake his virtue, but the vigilant interaction of God through the resurrection destroys them. As a Christian, our responsibility is to make sure that evil does not conquer goodness. As a missionary community, the Church is called to uphold the value of nonviolence not

in order to preserve its purity, but to express its fidelity to God. Non-violence is not a matter of legalism, but of discipleship. It is the way God has chosen to overthrow evil in the world, the praxis of God's system. Christians are to be non-violent because it reflects the very nature of God (Mt. 5:45, Lk. 6:35). It is not a fringe concern; it is the essence of the Gospel. Therefore, Jesus's nonviolent followers should not be called pacifists, but simply Christians.

In the Old Testament, the God who delivered an enslaved people in the Exodus is now seen as the deliverer of all humanity from oppression. The "value of relationality" is uniquely expressed in the Old Testament, Raymond Panicker proposes that the "Cosmo theandric vision" of reality stands for holistic and integral insight into the nature of all that is there. It has no centre. According to him, the three realities - God, human and nature are not the same; they co-exist and are not separable. The three interrelate and may be hierarchically constituted or coordinated. Everything that exists participates in this "Trinitarian" network. The principle of "being in relation to" is a significant principle for the theology of the environment. Hence, as responsible beings we should be receptive and resemble the qualities and characters of the Triune God for the fullness of life and holistic harmony. We can no longer see ourselves as rulers over nature, rather as guardians, caretakers, parents, trustees, lovers, co-creators, and friends of creation. When we preserve, keep and care, we are with God in creation.

Conclusion

It must be understood that a major part of Jesus' ministry was to re-establish proper relationships by teaching us to eliminate all types of violence, such as inequalities, injustice, oppression, and greed, which are the root causes of human problems and environmental crises. So let us look at His life and learn from Him for a better world. Some of the prophets of nonviolence such as Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King Jr, Dom Helder Camara, and Adolf Perez Esquivel inspire millions to uphold values of nonviolence and counter the forces of evil and culture of death and violence. They demonstrated the path of active nonviolence through their meaningful interactions within society. In order to foster nonviolence, one has to renounce the spirit of vengeance and embrace the power of love. Nothing is more subversive and transforming than love. Nonviolence depends on nurturing a culture of solidarity, dialogue, and participation. It is in the absence of these practices that a society turns violent. The thorn of violence will reduce if we stop oppressing others. We are created not for violence, not for oppression and exploitation, but for the preservation of the whole of creation and the establishment of the reign of God on this earth. This is the message of the Bible - a novel radiance to our Cosmos.



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
hen we hear the term nonviolence, two names come to mind immediately, Gandhi and Martin Luther King Jr., both inspired by Jesus Christ. Their practice of nonviolence in turbulent societies led to freedom and long-term social change. In fact, the struggle to practice nonviolence has continued. However, most religious, political, and social protests today seem to compromise justice and nonviolence. Pioneers of nonviolence movements believed that practice of nonviolence is an individual choice, which in turn could become collective wisdom. However, the Indian immigrant community does not seem to consider nonviolence as an individual strength, given the success collective nonviolent actions of Gandhiji,

that led to India's independence. Similarly, first generation Indians regard Martin Luther King Jr. as a leader of the civil rights movement in the US. However, it is important to note that Gandhi himself regarded nonviolence as not a political approach, but as a realization of spiritual strength within. This article is about the individual aspects of practicing nonviolence. Let us begin by examining the terms violence and nonviolence.

Violence is any physical, emotional, verbal, institutional, behavior, attitude, policy, or condition that dominates,

dehumanizes, diminishes, disrespects, or destroys us, or our fellow beings. Nonviolence, on the other hand, is a prototype of the fullness of life. It is a force for transformation, justice, and well-being. It is a powerful method for challenging and overcoming violence without using violence; for transforming and resolving conflict creatively.

Nonviolence is also the personal practice of not causing harm to others under any condition. It may come from the belief that hurting people, animals and/ or the environment is unnecessary to achieve a positive outcome. Practical aspects or nonviolence in action should come from individual conviction of being at peace with oneself. When our self (personality) is at peace, nonviolence becomes a spiritual action. In other words, the first step to nonviolence is within ourselves. Psychologists may call it the id, ego, superego balance. Spiritually, it is the fullness of life.

Practicing nonviolence begins by learning how to be less violent and more compassionate with ourselves. We learn by building the courage to speak and act with respect, honor, and reverence for our own being. In conflicting situations, personal accountability allows us to take responsibility for how we contribute to the conflict. Can we take responsibility for how we contribute to a conflict and make a different choice that can lead to a peaceful resolution? As Christians, the most important principle of nonviolence comes from Jesus' Sermon on the Mount, where he teaches the disciples not to return violence for violence but love their enemies and pray for those who persecute them (Matthew 5:38-48). This does not happen without a change happening within us. It is an attitude towards those who hurt us physically or emotionally. For Martin Luther King, nonviolence is "True pacifism," or "nonviolent resistance," a courageous confrontation of evil by the power of love" (Stride Toward Freedom King, Stride, 80). King believed that "the Christian doctrine of love operating through the Gandhian method of nonviolence was one of the most potent weapons available to oppressed people in their struggle for freedom" (King, Stride, 79; Papers 5:422). Martin Luther King considered Gandhi as the first person to transform Christian love into a powerful force for social change.

My life (life is what we practice not what we proclaim) is my message, says Gandhi. Write down what you want to stand for in your life. Note at least one way you can show, through action, that you stand for your beliefs. Take this action today. Prayer from the heart can achieve what nothing else in the world can, said Gandhi. Begin and end the day with a prayer for peace. Let peace begin with us by choosing not to engage in any form of gossip today and contribute to harmony. Gandhi wrote, nonviolence assumes that human nature unfailingly responds to the advances of love.

Another way to practice nonviolence is by seeing beyond outer differences in opinions, appearances, or goals. We must strive to find the meeting point of underlying unity that exists in diversity. When we work together, we are stronger than when we work alone. Today, find one significant way that you can cooperate more effectively with the people in your family or workplace, school, and community.



However, we live in such a time where there is more violence towards women than ever before. According to the Invisible Girl Project, more women and girls have been discriminated against and/or killed in the past century in India than any other modern day genocide. We have all probably heard of the term "genocide", but have we heard of "gendercide"? Gendercide is the "systematic killing of members of a specific gender". Specifically, female gendercide is prevalent in India today. This comes in different forms - whether through infant killings, abortions, or trafficking:

► Infant Killings (Infanticide) - The murder of a baby girl in India occurs more often than we think. According to Unicef, India is the only large country in the world where more girl babies die than boy babies. This practice is widely used that about 75% of girl infants are likely to die when compared to boys.

Abortions

Although India has laws in place to protect unborn children, the lack of education and enforcement of these laws causes about 700,000 girls to be aborted every year in India.

 Trafficking - Women are trafficked into being domestic workers or child brides, as there is such a huge gender gap between men and women due to the gendercide.

The violence, shame, and defeat women are put through in India and much across the world is the opposite of how we as Christians should treat women. The Christian perspective towards women should hold value over worldly perspectives, because Jesus held a very counter cultural view towards women. Jesus defied cultural norms, had women disciples, spoke identity into women who felt unworthy, and much more. Jesus treated women how they ought to be treated through his words and actions.








Figure 1 Right panel shows SEM images of flowers on the left panel. Black bar at the bottom right corner on SEM image shows a length of 20 micrometers. Reprinted with permission. Copyright: Springer Nature 1

29 stand out, "And why do you worry about your clothing? Look at the lilies of the field and how they grow. They don't work or make their clothing, yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are." I remember these verses from my childhood whenever I see the beautiful flowers in the field. Though the meaning of these verses is that there is no point in worrying about many things, the question that came to my mind was why the Bible talks explicitly about flowers of the field. There is no question they are incredibly beautiful, but why are they so beautiful? As I advanced my career as a nanotechnology scientist, I realized that this is also a scientific problem. Scientists believed for a long time that the color of the flowers was just due to the pigments present in their petals, until modern nanotechnology equipment like scanning electron microscopes (SEM) emerged. With the help of these equipment, scientists learned that the beautiful colors are also due to the extremely small nanopatterns

flowers that are invisible to the naked eye (Fig.1).1

You will realize why these flowers are so

"beautifully dressed" if you understand a little bit about nanotechnology. In simple terms, nanotechnology deals with materials and patterns in the order of one billionth of a meter, i.e., if you split a hair along its length 80,000 times, one section is about a nanometer (nm) thick. When you look at the petals of a lily flower under a scanning electron microscope, you see nanopatterns. When sunlight shines on these nanopatterns, light scatters, similar to the beautiful colors you see from some glass crystals (gratings) or the rainbow in the sky. The emitting colors depend on the size, spacing and shape of these nanopatterns and the angle at which light incident on them. This is why you see different colors and sometimes angle-dependent color effects. In flowers, these nanostructures are in addition to the color pigments present. These structures are a true engineering marvel from their creator!

You will appreciate the value of these nanostructures if you know how hard it is to develop even a square centimeter area of these structures manually. Not only is it expensive, but it is also extremely time-consuming to make. The variations in the size of these nanopatterns in flowers are hard to replicate in the laboratory. This means God made them precisely to provide them with the beauty He envisioned. By knowing the effort and time required to make structures similar to one of the petals of these flowers, I now completely understand the meaning of the verse, "yet Solomon in all his glory was not dressed as beautifully as they are."

God created humans on the last day of creation and man is considered the pinnacle of his creation. If we reflect on ourselves, we are much more complex than the lilies of the field. All creation is very dear to its creator. If God clothed the lilies of the field that bloom today and wither tomorrow with such precision, you can imagine how carefully he crafted us. The message is noticeably clear - each of us is so precious to God that there is no reason to worry about tomorrow.

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
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he timeless eternal love of Christ is revealed in our lives in different ways and when we meditate on it, it will inspire us to participate in the community to bring peace, love, and hope.

We get a perspective of timelessness from the parable of labourers in the vineyard as recorded in Matthew 20: 1-16. Jesus said that "the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out in the morning to hire labourers for his vineyard." The landowner called many workers to work in his vineyard at different times of the day; in the evening, he gave all of them equal wages irrespective of the time they worked. Jesus concludes this parable saying that the last will be first and the first will be last (also in Mark 10:31; Luke 13:30).

Our concept of time is a part of our existence, and we often link our accumulation of work, wealth, and life events and God to it. We know that chronological time is a measure of the light of the sun. God created the heaven and earth (Genesis 1:1) but we have surrendered much of our thinking to the concept of time governed by the sun and the moon. According to the gospel of John, in the beginning, Christ was the light (John 1:3-5). In the parable mentioned above, though the labourers worked for different durations of time, they all got the same wage, suggesting that in the kingdom of heaven, the human concept of time is irrelevant. We experience moments of timelessness when we immerse ourselves in the beauty of the moonlight

or watch the waves of the sea or hear a bird song. Such eternal moments of timelessness connect us to the divine and we feel the love of God and the depth of the love of Christ on the cross. God's eternal love helps us to transcend the concept of time and feel the omnipresence of God. Ezekiel's vision of the wheel in the sky (Ezekiel 10: 9-10) gives us the perspective of the omnipresence of God or in other words, the perspective that God is the light that transcends time. In the new Jerusalem, in Revelation 21: 23, the holy city of faith has no need for the sun or moon to shine on it, for the glory of God is its light and its lamp is Jesus Christ. Jesus said, "I am the Alpha and the Omega, the first and the last, the beginning and the end" (Revelation 22: 13). When God makes everything new (Revelation 21: 5, 6). time is reset and we have the promise that our sins are forgiven in Christ, and it is a new beginning. This fulfills the prophetic promise in Isaiah 1:18: "Though your sins are like scarlet, they shall be like snow; though they are red like crimson, they shall become like wool." It is the timeless eternal love of Christ that helps us to love God and love one another.



Such a deep experience of timeless eternal love evokes empathy in us to walk with the pain of those who experience poverty, homelessness, and domestic violence. Empathy is not simply pity. "In empathy, observers imagine the experience of another 'as if' the experience were their own, whereas sympathy suggests that the observer is absorbed or immersed in feeling all the experiences of the other, sometimes resulting in a feeling of pity for the person"1. The causes of these social issues are many, related to political brokenness and there is no simple solution. Economic recession, unbearable stress at work, and breakdown of social systems may lead to situations of job loss, loss of homes, family breakdown, and mental illness. Some people fall into the trap of addiction. We are living in a post-modern world and post modernity2, which is characterized by disoriented, aimless, and lonely living that creates stress. Family support to deal with stressful situations in life can help victims of domestic violence. Women are mostly victims of domestic violence and listening to their voices is an important part of counseling.3 Often women are generalized and viewed through stereotypes created by media, television, and movies. Women have within them the resources and knowledge to create a new life; helping them bring out their true voices will help them out of situations of domestic violence. There are many things we can do to help people in crisis. Listening to their stories is an important empathic action. Helping people looking for work find jobs, campaigning support for affordable housing, and supporting a food bank are some other examples of empathic responses.

Students in a school in Afghanistan formed a singing group called "Sounds of Afghanistan" after the fall of the Taliban in 2001. They exhibited hope and courage and resisted attempts by the Taliban to ban women's education. The students were later given refuge in Canada for a new life.

In 2020, Marcus Rushford, the young superstar of 'Manchester United' in the United Kingdom, campaigned for continuing free meals for needy children in schools in UK during the summer. He succeeded in winning over public opinion and influencing the government's decision to meet the challenge of addressing child poverty in schools.

Ray Suarez is a successful journalist who lost his job recently and found it difficult to get a suitable job. He saw the reality of poverty in America. He now runs a podcast titled 'Going for Broke' to bring the stories of those in crisis. He points out that more action from the government is needed to help the poor. The support for those in need is to be motivated by love and it can open the minds of people and help us move away from a dead-end as a community.

The first verse of a song written by the Very Rev. K. S. Mathew titled "Through the Corridors of Time" is as follows:

"Through the corridors of time A voice resounds 'Ecce Homo' (Behold the man) As we seek to be human, it's a chime Behold the Son of Man"

Time is a part of our thinking. But when we look back, we can see the presence of Christ in our life – parents who loved us dearly, siblings who took care of us, friends who gave us important counsel, doctors who made critical diagnoses, and numerous such persons. The presence of Christ in our life prepares us for a new reality transcending our time constrained thinking.

As a community, we often face chaos. But if we look deeply, it reveals the source of the chaos. Collective narrative practice⁴ is a method for addressing the source of the chaos through art, stories, songs, and prayers bringing people together. Such acts of love will bring peace to the community and heal the enemy's madness as mentioned in Samuel Taylor Coleridge's poem, 'Love.' An example of narrative practice is the work of George Butler, an illustrator, who went to Ukraine to sketch the scenes of conflict there. Such works will convey the message of togetherness and open avenues for solutions out of love.

When we meditate on the timeless eternal love of Christ, we will be able to engage in social actions to bring peace, love, and hope to the world. May the presence of Christ be with us all.





നാട്ടിലിപ്പോൾ നടക്കുന്ന സമരങ്ങളിൽ ഒരിനമാണല്ലോ സത്യ ഗ്രഹ സമരം. പലപ്പോഴും പ്രകോപനപരമായ മുദ്രാവാക്വ ങ്ങളും പ്രസംഗങ്ങളുമായി സത്യഗ്രഹം കൊഴുക്കാറുണ്ട്. എന്നാൽ ഗാന്ധിജി വിഭാവനം ചെയ്ത സത്വഗ്രഹവുമായി ഈ സമരങ്ങളെ ഒന്നു തട്ടിച്ചു നോക്കാം. ഗാന്ധിജി പറ യുന്നു 'സത്വഗ്രഹം കൊണ്ട് ഞാൻ അർഥമാക്കുന്നത് സത്വത്തെ മുറുകെ പിടിക്കുക എന്നതാണ്. തിന്മയും തിന്മ ചെയ്യുന്ന ആളും തമ്മിൽ വ്വത്വാസമുണ്ടെന്ന കാര്യം സത്വ ഗ്രഹി മറക്കാൻ പാടില്ല. തിന്മ ചെയ്യുന്നവർക്കെതിരെ വിദ്വേ ഷദോ പകയോ വച്ച് പുലർത്തരുത്. എപ്പോഴും തിന്മയെ നന്മകൊണ്ടും കോപത്തെ സ്നേഹം കൊണ്ടും അസത്വത്തെ സത്യം കൊണ്ടും കീഴ്പ്പെടുത്താനാണ് ശ്രമിക്കുക. അതു കൊണ്ട് സത്യഗ്രഹസമരത്തിലിരിക്കുന്ന ഒരാൾ കോപം, വിദ്വേഷം തുടങ്ങിയ മാനുഷിക ദൗർബല്യങ്ങളിൽനിന്ന് താൻ തന്നെ പൂർണമായും വിമുക്തനാണെന്നും തന്റെ സത്യഗ്രഹം കൊണ്ട് ഇല്ലാതാക്കാനൊരുങ്ങുന്ന തിന്മകൾ തന്നെ പിടികൂടിയിട്ടിലെന്നും ഉറപ്പുവരുത്തേണ്ടതുണ്ട്. ഇതി നായി സത്യഗ്രഹി ശ്രദ്ധാപൂർവം ആത്മപരിശോധന നട ത്തുകയും ചെയ്യണം 'സമരത്തെ എത്ര ഉന്നതമായ ഭാവ ത്തിലാണ് ഗാന്ധിജി വ്യാഖ്യാനിച്ചിരിക്കുന്നത്.





Approximately 25 children from the Choctaw community participated. A team of fifteen volunteers from Dallas and New York organized the VBS and provided leadership.

Tania Bijili (MTC Dallas, FB) served as the VBS Director and was supported by Elisa Andrews (MTC Dallas, FB), Jessica Abraham (Sehion MTC Dallas), Jiffy Philip (Sehion MTC Dallas), Juliann Idichandy (MTC Dallas, FB), Kristen Idichandy (MTC Dallas, FB), Jibin Mathew (MTC Dallas, FB), Aaron John (MTC Dallas, FB), Selwin Stanly (MTC Dallas, FB), Kezia Cherian (St. Paul's MTC Dallas), Jacob Idichandy (MTC Dallas, FB), George Mathew

(MTC Dallas, FB), Neethi Prasad (New York), and Rev. Christopher Daniel (New York).

The theme for VBS was "Mystery Island: Tracking Down the One True God." Serving the Choctaw Indians: 20th Anniversary of the Alabama VBS Mission

The history of the Native American people within the United States is a painful one. For the Alabama MOWA band of Choctaw Indians, they had a long journey to even be acknowledged by their state, let alone the federal government as an actual tribe. Much of their history was destroyed by racially charged attacks and many of their people had died due to harsh circumstances. Substance abuse and lack of education is a continual struggle for the younger generations. The Mar Thoma Church has seen this mission come to fruition and become a bridge and stepping-stone for the gospel amongst the children of a persecuted and hurt people

With humble beginnings in 2003, the tireless efforts of Mrs. Nirmala Abraham and Mr. O. C. Abraham, and the dedication of its numerous volunteers, we have served this community for 20 years. This year's Alabama VBS mission was held at Aldersgate United Methodist Church. from June 16th to June 18th. Rev. Saju Samuel, Vicar of Atlanta Mar Thoma Church, along with a team of 30+ volunteers, from New York, Philadelphia, and Atlanta came together with a purpose - to make a difference and bring the community closer to Jesus. Volunteers included this year's coordinators Divya Jacob and Shon Mathew who under the leadership of Mrs. Nirmala Abraham, Mr. O. C. Abraham, and Dr. Suresh Mathews participated in the 3-day event. It was attended by the children and youth of the community. The theme of this year's VBS was "Spark Studios", and was based on Ephesians 2:10, "For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared ahead of time for us to do." There were nearly 40 kids, of all ages, who attended this year's VBS.

The children learned about the care, hope, love and joy of Jesus through biblical stories such as God being the marvelous creator, Jesus the King that God promised to save us and Holy Spirit the helper who gives us the power to follow God's plan. Special events included:

- Pow wow, which is a sacred social gathering held by many Native American communities. A modern Pow wow is a specific type of event for Native Americans to meet, dance, sing, socialize and honor their culture. The Pow wow was led by Morgan Byrd. who introduced us to the regalia that is specific to the MOWA Choctaw Native Americans and led an informative session describing their culture and heritage.
- The kids were also encouraged and energized by an instructional Dance session led by the Atlanta Mar Thoma Church. A Nutrition Education session was held for the community members, which was

organized and led by 3 Dietetic interns, with guidance from Dr. Suresh Mathews.

 20th Anniversary Celebration – By God's grace, this year we celebrated 20 years of Mar Thoma Church conducting Native American missions in Alabama. A reception was hosted for 10 Choctaw youth, who were recipients of the Mar Thoma Mission Board scholarship. Speakers for the 20th Anniversary celebration included: Rev. Barbara Brewi, pastor of Aldersgate United Methodist Church, MOWA Choctaw Tribal Chief, Lebaron Byrd, Bro. George Weaver, community leader - Mrs. June Weaver, Native American Mission Coordinator, Mrs. Nirmala Abraham, and Diocesan Treasurer, Mr. George Babu. Mr. O. C. Abraham and Mrs. Nirmala Abraham were honored with a plaque, by the Tribal Chief and June Weaver, for their 20 years of dedication and service to the VBS.

The goal within VBS was to model the love and humility of Jesus Christ to children in every way possible. Whether it was through skits to help the kids visualize the stories more, connecting sports and their love for it to their walk with Jesus, singing songs of worship with them,

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or genuinely being open about the lives we lead, seeds of the gospel were sown. Strangers became friends and friends became family, as the hearts of gratitude amongst every child and parent became evident. The week provided fun, worship, and outlets to hear about the difficulties they have faced as individuals growing up as a Native American community in Alabama. We also assisted in conducting a fundraiser for charity, girls vs. boys competition, which was accompanied by a "kiss the goat" event for the team with less funds raised. While it was a laugh for everyone involved, this event raised a total of \$315 which was funded mostly by the kids themselves.

A primary goal of the mission was to see the youth become leaders within their own church and run the VBS themselves. Even amongst the younger kids, their eyes lit up with excitement as they exclaimed their desire to become volunteers and serve in the future. Some of the Native American children, who have grown up with the many Mar Thoma mission teams that attended earlier, now look forward to going to college. One student graduated with a BS degree in Nursing and has started working as a nurse, and another student will graduate in December this year with a degree in marketing, among others. The Mar Thoma Church is continuing to seek more ways to help Native American students pursue higher education. As the church has sought to provide this VBS as an alternative to temptations that often pervades the community, we are giving back in both tangible and intangible ways to the Choctaw community. Their love and embrace are hard to let go and remain with you well after you have departed.

The Mar Thoma Volunteers' experience cannot be overlooked. We are all built to live a Christ-centered life, and mission is a chance to put that into practice in its truest form. As such, the experience of dedicating months of planning and 3 days of actual VBS time in service of Jesus is a privilege. To wake up with a crystal-clear sense of purpose and to go to bed in the same way is uniquely fulfilling, and it is a feeling that volunteers can take with them and apply in their daily lives. Each morning there were devotional messages given by a volunteer to prepare for the VBS day ahead. Each evening there were speakers that touched on several topics including pursuing God even in life's darkest moments and using our God-given talents with a purpose.

Additionally, to be welcomed into a community so different from ours, was an eye-opening experience. While this mission has been a longstanding contribution to Mt. Vernon, the impact of our presence in 2022 could often be seen almost instantaneously. The connections made in this community as well as the bonds developed among the Mar Thoma volunteers are sure to be strong and long lasting. Many of the members of our church have heard about the Native American Mission for years and have thought about attending. But "life" has gotten in the way of making plans to do so. The next Alabama VBS mission will be held June 12-16, 2023. We urge anyone interested to consider and make this a priority. It is truly a blessing for all those involved. While the impact we make as a church in the Mt. Vernon community is profound, what's even more so is the impact the mission had upon the very volunteers of this mission. We come to serve, but in the end the mission serves us as well. Rather than letting "Lighted to Lighten" be just the motto of The Mar Thoma Church, let's pray we take on opportunities like this mission trip to live out this motto fruitfully and abundantly.

Native American Mission VBS Camp in Navajoland

July 20-23, 2022 (Farmington, New Mexico)


The People:

To the world they are known as 'Navajos', a name given by Spanish colonizers. But the Navajos refer to themselves as Diné meaning 'The People'. They are a quiet and reflective people, proud of their land, language and culture with deep seated hurt and pain stemming from memories of their recent history. In 1863 with the goal of westernizing and Christianizing the Navajos, they

were forcibly evicted from their native land and made to walk hundreds of miles east on 'The Long Walk of the Navajo' to Fort Sumner. Several thousands died, were abducted or killed during this period that lasted nearly five years. Eventually, in 1868 a treaty was signed and they returned to their native land. Another source of painful memories was the boarding schools that the Navajo children were forced to attend.

The vital role played by the Navajo Code Talkers in securing victory for the US in the Pacific during WWII evokes a great sense of pride in the Navajos. The Marine Corp initially recruited 29 Navajo youth who created code words in the Navajo language which was then used for top secret military communication in the Pacific. The significance of the Navajo contribution is summarized in the words of Maj. Howard Connor, "were it not for the Navajos, the marines would never have taken Iwo .lima"

The Land:

The Navajo call their land Dinétah - land of 'The People'. Theirs is the largest (27,000 sq miles) and most populous (300,000) among the reservations in the USA. The land is unique in beauty and grandeur with high mesas, deep canyons and outcroppings of rock formations. Monument Valley Tribal Park, one of the most photographed places in the world, is located in the Navajo reservation.

The Mission:

Mr. O. C. Abraham and Mrs. Nirmala Abraham worked tirelessly coordinating the efforts with the Episcopal Church of Navajoland, planning the two day VBS and ensuring that no detail was overlooked. The theme, curriculum, craft activities, game sessions were thought out and coordinated by Kezia Cherian. The theme was 'Welcome Home'. Lessons were based on passages from Luke and Ezra - the parable of the prodigal son and the rebuilding of Jerusalem temple after the





Babylonian captivity. Twenty children, from Pre-K to 8th grade attended. They were divided into three groups. The day began with breakfast, O. C. Uncle coordinated the food department, Joby Achen, Arun Achen, Sharon, Neha, Chrissen, Snophia, and Elijah led the singing and general sessions. This was followed by lesson time, craft activities, lunch, games and the day ended with another general session where Joby Achen showcased his 'magic powers' while presenting the gospel. Shaji Ramapuram, the resident journalist, penned an article in the Manorama Global Malayli online edition, explaining the mission. Elijah was the youngest volunteer in our group - quiet and unobtrusive, always ready and willing to help wherever help was needed. The Navajo tribe is a matrilineal community: the grandmothers play a vital role in the upbringing of grandchildren and in the transmission of their history and culture to the younger generation. A class for the grandmothers was organized and led by a local church leader. T-Shirt painting was a unique and fun activity. Everyone who attended received a blank white T-Shirt and was encouraged to creatively express their uniqueness using fabric paints.

Rev. Cornelia Eaton, canon to the ordinary (Episcopal Bishop), was a Navajo shepherdess prior to becoming a priest. We had the privilege of visiting her parish, her sheep camp, and also took part in a sunset prayer ceremony at her ranch that incorporated Navajo traditions that included the use of the 'Navajo basket' and the scattering of corn flour as each of us expressed our gratitude to God. She also introduced us to the Navajo 'Beauty way' prayer. Rev. Michael Sells and Rev. Jack Chase, two local parish priests, were our other contacts who worked closely with us assisting us throughout our stay.

A cultural exchange night was organized on the last day. It was an opportunity to highlight and understand various aspects of Navajo and Indian life. The art of



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making traditional Navajo Fry Bread was demonstrated to us. Several Navajo and Indian dishes were prepared and enjoyed by everyone. The Navajos sang a song in their language and invited us to join them in one of their traditional dances. Nirmala Aunty, Sharon Kochamma, Chrissen, and Snophia, planned a program that showcased the diversity of Indian society; Joby Achen, Arun Achen, and Shaji sang a lovely Malayalam song; O. C. Uncle presented a video on St. Thomas and Christianity in India. At the end, as an expression of their gratitude to us, a Navajo hat was presented to O. C. Uncle.

God's sovereignty, providence, and faithfulness were revealed to us in many ways. In the words of Sharon

Kochamma, "We had a most blessed time at Farmington, with a wonderful group of 12 ... We sang together, prayed and ate together, cooked, played, laughed and swapped stories: strangers we were, but the bond of Christ strengthened us and we worked together as one body of Christ on this mission trip, indulging in new experiences, so special and unique that it cannot be described in words. It has to be experienced to really comprehend that true feeling of being among a special group of people, the Navajo Nation, who accepted us into their community and their traditions as one of their own, making us promise that we would come back!"

Native American Mission VBS Camp in Dulac, Louisiana

August 11-13, 2022

Dulac: Une Communauté Délaissée

Introduction

The Diocese of North America and Europe of the Mar Thoma Church has developed a life changing opportunity through the Native American Mission. This is a chance for many of our members to reach out and share the love of Christ with Native Americans.

An Unforeseen Journey to Louisiana

As part of this outreach, our group took part in a pioneering mission to Houma, Louisiana and conducted the first ever Bible camp among the people of the United Houma Nation. The members of our group traveled from Philadelphia, Baltimore and Houston, and after enduring multiple flight delays into New Orleans and a 1 hour onward road trip, we finally arrived in Houma.

Historical Perspective

The term "Houma" is a Choctaw word meaning "red". When the French explorers came to the Southern part of Louisiana in 1682, they found the Houma Native Americans living in villages along the Mississippi River. The Houma Natives and the French became great allies and trade partners. In the early 18th century, growing conflict between the English and the French forced many Native Americans to ally themselves with either





one empire or the other and the Houma people stayed loval to the French.

In 1803, after the purchase of the Louisiana territory from the French, the United States signed a treaty, with a promise to recognize and uphold all existing treaties and articles regarding Native Americans. Sadly, this treaty was not honored. History is witness to the persecution and trauma endured by the Native Americans. Till date, the federal government does not recognize the Houma people as an official tribe, making them ineligible for any government and financial assistance.

Life in Dulac

Dulac is a 20 minute drive south of Houma. The word "du lac" translates to "by the lake" in French, and Dulac is situated between many lakes, canals, and bayous. Though English is widely spoken, most of the older Houma speak a dialect of French. Historically, the Houma children were not allowed to attend public schools until the state of Louisiana forced the school system to racially integrate in the late 1960s, disenfranchising an entire generation. The locals take up traditional professions such as shrimping, wood working, basket weaving, and fishing. This meant that most of the people who took up jobs like shrimping at a young age did not have the qualifications for any other positions in the workforce.

Hurricane Ida in August of 2021 wrecked widespread damage along the gulf shores, specifically destroying Dulac. Most of the community lost their homes, vehicles, and possessions. The local elementary school is shut down due to damages from Hurricane Ida compelling the children to attend classes in overcrowded trailers. One year later, families still live in trailers provided by FEMA. This along with loss of land from encroaching water is pushing families to move out of Dulac.

Rev. Kirby Verret serves as the pastor of Clanton Chapel United Methodist. Clanton Chapel sustained severe damages after Hurricane Ida and needs considerable restoration to be utilized as a place of worship. When touring the remains of the church, Rev. Kirby showed us their Native handcrafted vestments, all of which had specific symbolic relevance to the Houma, such as sweet grass woven edging and a design of grapes made out of Spanish moss.

The First Ever Bible Camp in Dulac

By the grace of God, our mission trip to Louisiana marked the start of summer Bible Camp for Houma children by the Mar Thoma Church. Spearheaded by Mr. O. C. Abraham and Mrs. Nirmala Abraham, we went in with no expectations, but a hint of optimism in our minds. Once we ascertained the damages sustained by the Dulac Community Center (our intended venue), we opted for the next best alternative, a moderately damaged but restored preschool across from the





community center. This modest space became home to our Bible Camp 2022.

Our theme was "Make Waves - What You Do Today Can Change the World Around You". Ten children registered for the Bible Camp, aged 4 to 13 years old. The children enthusiastically learned action songs, attentively listened to the Bible stories, and engaged in lesson discussions and crafts. Each child received a Bible, courtesy of the youth fellowship of the Phoenix Mar Thoma Church. At the end of our experience, we were exhausted, but had a deep sense of fulfillment. We knew that God's work had been done through us, and that is an incredible feeling.

Rev. Kirby's response sums it up for us:

"Thank you for a great event and great fellowship! We truly appreciate and enjoyed the Bible Camp. Our children felt the Love you shared with them and with all they have gone through in the last 3 years, this Bible Camp truly lifted up their spirits. The fact that you all traveled far to come to Dulac truly touched their hearts and made them realize how special they are before you and God.

Despite successive challenges from hurricanes and the pandemic, as well as not being federally recognized. the Houma people find support among their tight-knit community and we were fortunate to experience this. These few days reminded us of not only what it means to be blessed, but also of how much we are at a loss by indulging ourselves in the things and ideals of the world. Though they do not ask, there are many ways we can help the Houma and better their prospects in life. We hope that our experience inspires you to learn more about une communauté délaissée, the neglected community of the Houmas in Dulac, Louisiana and partake in the activities of the Native American Mission. Let's pray with all our heart:

Heavenly Father,

Teach us what it means to be blessed. Use us for your kingdom purpose. Equip and send us to share with the Lord's people who are in need. Soften our hearts and renew our minds to love altruistically with actions and in truth. Amen.



A TAX REDUCTION STRATEGY FOR **SENIORS**



(A DEDUCTION FOR NON - ITEMIZING TAXPAYERS)

(Prof. Philip Thomas, MBA, CPA, CGMA) QUALIFIED CHARITABLE DISTRIBUTION (QCD) - A STRATEGY TO REDUCE AGI AND FEDERAL INCOME TAXES

♦ In 2022, an individual 72 years old or over can donate directly from their retirement accounts to charities up to \$100,000. This will help especially individuals who do not use itemized deduction on their federal tax return as standard deduction is greater than itemized deductions. Direct distribution from IRA account to an organization eligible to receive tax deductible contribution will be excluded from the adjusted gross income of the taxpayer which means taxpayer is availing a full deduction for such transfers from retirement accounts whether itemizing or not. In effect, for those who do not itemize, this deduction will be in addition to standard deduction. The \$100,000 is an annual limit. Therefore, a donor can do it every year.

For taxpayers filing joint return limit of \$100,000 apply to each spouse. This strategy makes more productive as many taxpayers may not have to itemize.

REQUIRED MINIMUM DISTRIBUTION (RMD), FEDERAL INCOME TAXES AND QCD

- Individuals are required to withdraw a minimum amount from their retirement accounts for the year they turn 72 years old and onward. RMD amount will be some percentage (depends on many factors) of the total balance in each retirement account. RMD results in increase in taxable income and the tax liability of many taxpayers.
 - RMD may result in increase in taxable portion of taxpayer's social security benefits which will result in higher taxable income and higher tax bill. For some taxpayers, RMD may cause modified adjusted gross income to rise over \$91,000 for single filers and \$182,000 for married filers resulting in higher monthly premium for Medicare B coverage.
- One strategy to reduce RMD is charitable contribution directly from retirement account to favorite charity as mentioned above (QCD). (DONATE YOUR RMD TO YOUR FAVORITE CHARITY).
- Another strategy to be considered by some individuals to reduce the RMD amount is buying Qualified Longevity Annuity Contract (QLAC). You may invest up to \$145,000 from your retirement account in QLAC. QLAC is a special version of deferred annuity contract. Money transferred to a QLAC is ignored when figuring RMD, which reduces the size of RMD resulting in lower taxes. Remember, you are deferring the taxes to a future year. When one starts payouts from QLAC later that will be included in income. A QLAC can protect your savings from market fluctuations.

Caveat: These are only general guidelines. Please consult your professional financial/tax advisor before making any financial decisions.





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
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
